

John Stevens — came before me one of His Majesty's Justices
of the Peace for the County of *Essex* and made Oath that He
was admitted an Out-Pensioner of *Chelsea College*, on the *25th* Day of *June*
1763 from the *1st* Regiment of *Foot*
commanded by *Lt. Genl. Kaper*; was then aged
about *39* Years; served in the Army *20* Years; was discharged for
being murthered and worn out in the service
and that he is no otherwise provided for by the Government, but as a Pensioner
of the said College; and now lives in the Parish of *St. Botolph*
Colchester in the County of *Essex*
City of London *he verith*

Note, That the Blanks in the foregoing Affidavit are to be filled up as follows:
The 1st Blank with the Name of the Pensioner,
2d Blank with the County in which the Justice of the Peace acts.
3d Blank with the precise Day on which the Pensioner was admitted.
4th Blank with the Number of the Regiment in which he served, whether
of Horse, Dragoons or Foot.
5th Blank, with the Name of the General or Colonel, by whom it was,
or is commanded.
6th Blank, with the Number of Years he was then old.
7th Blank, with the Number of Years he served in the Army.
8th Blank, with his Wounds, Disabilities, or Infirmities for which he was
discharged.
9th Blank, with the Parish, (mentioning the next Market Town in the
County) where the Pensioner lives.
10th Blank, with the Day, Month, and Year on which the Affidavit is
made.

Note, That immediately after every 25th of December, and every 25th of June,
and sent inclosed in a Cover directed [Thus] To the Right Honourable the Pay-
master General, at the Horse Guards, London.

If the Pensioner fails to observe these Directions, as well as to remember that
the Justice dates the Affidavit when sign'd, he will be chequed upon the
Books of the Secretary's Office, and will find some Difficulty before he be
put to Rights.
